

Casa Cornelia's Children's Program -An Update

Children's Program Response

- Children Detained in San Diego
 - Continue services to all beds in SD
 - Increase volunteer involvement, especially attorneys from private bar
 - Direct Services Model
 - Volunteer Services Model
 - Self help Model
- Children Released in San Diego (Non-Detained)
 - Increase staff and add volunteers to assist growing number in need
 - Prepare for projected increase in children appearing in local court
- Outreach to Non-Detained undetected children

What We Still Need

- Additional attorneys to manage the crisis
- Full-time case/data manager(s)

 Paralegal(s) for legal case and program management assistance

Upgrading internet bandwidth/IT

Local Impact

- Number of children served by Casa Cornelia has increased 106% since 2011
- □ Change in detention policy: children detained locally released in 5-10 days instead of 30-45 days
- Change in trend: more siblings, girls, and younger children
- Increased trauma identification: in country of origin or enroute
- Adjustment issues/sponsor inability to provide adequate care

Each child....

- Will need an attorney who is knowledgeable about immigration law
- All persons who are before an Immigration Judge have a right to be represented but **do not** have a right to appointed counsel or representative, not even children.
- Fifth Amendment Due Process Clause and the Immigration and Nationality Act's provisions requiring a "full and fair hearing"
 - J.E.F.M. v. Holder, was filed in
 U.S. District Court in Seattle, WA
