

What Rights
Do I Have
While In
Placement?





This booklet has been prepared by the San Diego County Public Defender's Office. It is important that you know your legal rights when you are in a foster home or a group home. Although the law allows foster parents or group home staff to make rules and to put some limits on your freedom, you do not lose certain personal rights just because you are not living with your family.

If You Have a Complaint

You have the right to contact Community Care Licensing of the State Department of Social Services or the State Foster Care Ombudsperson regarding any violation of your rights. You have a right to speak to persons from these offices confidentially, and to be free from threats or punishment for making any complaints. [WIC 16001.9(8)]

- If you have a complaint about your case, you can tell your social worker, CASA, and/or lawyer.
- If you have a complaint about your lawyer, you can call his/her supervisor at (858) 974-5700.
- If you have a complaint about your social worker, you can call his/her supervisor.
- If you have any concerns about your case, or the care you are receiving, you can also call the Office of the Ombudsperson for Foster Care at their toll-free number, 1-877-846-1602.

Visits

- You have the right to visit with your parents, sisters, brothers, and family, unless the court has decided that you should not. [WIC 16507(a), 16001.9(a)(7)]
- You have the right to see visitors at your home and to know in advance the visiting policy or rules of your foster or group home. [WIC 16002(a)(15): 22 CCR 87072(a)(10)]

Health Care

- You should receive the medical, dental, vision and mental health services you need. [WIC 16001.9(a)(4)]
- You can receive Medi-Cal benefits until your 21st birthday. [42 USC 1396(a)(10)(A)(XV); WIC 14005.28]
- You may refuse medication or chemical substances not ordered by a physician. [WIC 16001.9 (a)(5), 160012.9(a) (5); CCR 87072(a)(8)]
- You may consent to hospital, medical, or surgical care related to
- the prevention or treatment of pregnancy. [Ca. Fam. Code 6925(a)]

Sexually Transmitted Diseases, Sexual Assault, Mental Health & Substance Abuse Care

If you are 12 years of age or older, you have the right, without the consent of others to:

- Diagnosis and treatment of certain infections, contagious sexually transmitted diseases, including AIDS and HIV testing. [Ca. Fam. Code 6926(a)]
- Hospital, medical, and surgical care for diagnosis and treatment of alleged rape or sexual assault. [Ca. Fam. Code 6927, 6928]
- Medical care and counseling for drug and alcohol related problems. [Ca. Fam. Code 6929(b)]
- Outpatient mental health treatment, if you are a danger to yourself or others or are the victim of incest or child abuse. [Ca. Fam. Code 6924]

Legal Proceedings

If you are ten years of age or older, you have the right:

- To be told in advance of all hearings in your case. [WIC 335, 336, 336.21(a)(b), 366.23]
- To attend all court hearings concerning you. [WIC 399, WIC 16001.9(a)(17)]
- To be represented in court by a lawyer who will do what is necessary to protect you and your rights and will tell the court what you want. [WIC 317(d)(e)]
- To meet with your lawyer before each court hearing. [WIC 349]
- To talk with the judge. [WIC 16001.9]
- To confidentiality of your court file, but information can be shared with people who need to know about you to provide you with care and services. [WIC 10850(a), 16001.9(a)(21); 22 CCR 87070(c); CRC 1423(a)(b)]
- To meet with your social worker at least once a month. [WIC 16516.5; DSSM 31-320.414]
- To be told what the plan is for your placement and future and to know about changes. [WIC 16001.9(a)(19)]

Privacy & Confidentiality

- Talks with your lawyer are confidential. [Evid. Code 952]
- You have the right to confidential phone calls and to send and receive unopened letters, unless these rights have been limited for a good reason. [WIC 16001.9(a)(9); 22 CCR 87072(a)(16), 84072 (b)(12)]
- Even if you are being disciplined, you can still make and receive confidential phone calls to your social worker, lawyer, or CASA. [WIC 16002(a)(6): 22 CCR 87072(a)(15), 84072(b)(11)]

Your Money

- You have the right to keep your own money. [WIC 16001.9(a)(11); 22 CCR 84077, 84072(b)(8)]
- If you are in a group home, you have the right to receive an allowance, unless your case plan says you shouldn't. [WIC 16001.9(a)(3); 22 CCR 84077(a)(2)]
- If you are 16 years old and participating in ILS services, you have a right to save up to \$10,000 to prepare you to leave foster care. This is called an "emancipation account". [WIC 11155.5(a), 16001.9(a)(11)]
- No matter how old you are, you may save money in a different account than an emancipation account, but any money over \$1,000 may be used by the government to help pay for your foster care, unless you put it in a blocked trust account. Talk with your lawyer if you have questions about this right. [WIC 11257(a)]

Physical Safety

You have the right to be protected from abuse and neglect. [WIC 16001.9(a)(2); 22 CCR 80072, 87072(a)(2]

- You have the right to be free from humiliation, intimidation, ridicule, or mental abuse. [22 CCR 80072(a)(3), 87072(a)(3)]
- No one can punish you by hitting or injuring you. [22 CCR 80072(a)(3), 87072(a)(3)]
- No one can punish you by taking away your food or clothes or not allowing you to sleep or use the bathroom. [22 CCR 80072(a)(3), 87072(a)(3)]
- You have a right to be free from unreasonable searches of your personal belongings. [WIC 16001.9(a)(20)]

Food, Clothing and Housing

You have the right to food, clean clothes, a clean bed and safe, comfortable housing. [WIC 16001.9(a)(3): 22 CCR 80072, 87072(a)(2)&(3)]

- You should be provided with three meals per day. [22 CCR 80076(a)(2)]
- You may wear your own clothes, use your own things and have your own, private storage space. [WIC 16001.9(a)(18): 22 CCR 84072(b)(6) & (10), 87072(a)(11) & (13) & (14)]

Personal Freedom

- 1. You should be treated with dignity and respect by foster parents or by staff and residents in your home. [WIC 16001.9(a)(1); 22 CCR 80072(a)(1), 87072(a)(1)]
- 2. You should not be locked in any room or building by your foster parents or by staff and are entitled to reasonable freedom so long as you follow house rules. [WIC 16001.9(a)(12); 22 CCR 80072(a)(7), 87072(a)(6)]
- 3. You have the right to attend school, religious services that you choose, and to participate in school, religious and community activities. [WIC 16001.9(a)(10) & (13); 22 CCR 80072(a)(5), 87072(a)(5), 84079(c), 87079]
- 4. You have the right to work and develop job skills at an age-appropriate level consistent with state law. [WIC 16001.9(14)]
 - Your right to work may be limited by your foster parent or group home, but only for a good reason.
- 5. You have the right to attend Independent Living Program classes and activities if you meet age requirements. [WIC 16001.9(16)]
- 6. You have the right to have social contacts with people outside of the foster care system, such as teachers, church members, mentors, and friends. [WIC 16001.9(15)]
- 7. You should not be required to perform duties that unreasonably interfere with school, training, treatment programs or family visits. [22 CCR 87079]
